

## How to Undo my Last Restore (XP)

1. Log on to Windows as an Administrator using your password.
2. Click **Start**, point to **All Programs**, then **Accessories**, then **System Tools**, and then click **System Restore**.



3. On the **Welcome to System Restore** page, click to select the **Undo my last restoration** option, and then click **Next**.  
\* **Note** A System Restore message may appear that shows the changes that *System Restore* will make. Click **OK**.

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## Welcome to System Restore

You can use System Restore to undo harmful changes to your computer and restore its settings and performance. System Restore returns your computer to an earlier time (called a restore point) without causing you to lose recent work, such as saved documents, e-mail, or history and favorites lists.

Any changes that System Restore makes to your computer are completely reversible.

Your computer automatically creates restore points (called system checkpoints), but you can also use System Restore to create your own restore points. This is useful if you are about to make a major change to your system, such as installing a new program or changing your registry.

To continue, select an option, and then click Next.

4. On the **Confirm Restoration Undo** page, click **Next**. System Restore restores the original Windows XP configuration, and then restarts the computer.
5. Log on to the computer as Administrator. The System Restore **Undo Complete** page appears.
